3. Correspondence:

- a) A letter from Dr. Paul Prevett requesting the submission of an interim report on the Backus Woods Project (as referred to above). This will be done as soon as possible.
- b) A reply was received from the Ministry of Natural Resources stating that the limited aerial spraying of the Spruce Budworm and the Gypsy Moth will contain the Bacillus thuringiensis only.
- c) A reply was received from Environment Canada explaining the agreement reached with the Friends of Wye Marsh.
- d) A letter from the Long Point Bird Observatory, together with the 1985 directory of naturalist's projects in Ontario. This directory lists everything about the project (purpose, personnel, contact people).
- e) A letter from the Federation of Ontario Naturalists containing a listing of their Fall trips.
- g) A letter from member Irene Trigg who wishes to trade material for some species from Japan.

4. Financial report:

The 1984/85 season concluded with \$51.00 in the account. The account has now been transferred to a Daily Interest Savings type, as the monthly charges on the other account were increasing. Present balance is \$1288 (including the \$1000 from M.N.R.) and 17 members have paid their dues to date. Please get dues in as soon as possible!!

5. New Business:

The second meeting of the season was held on October 12th in the Planetarium Lecture Room starting at 1:00 p.m. In attendance were Alan Hanks, John Eberlie, Mel Tintpulver, Bert Wigg, Jim Spottiswood, Bill Edmonds, Quimby Hess, Doug Scovell, Gord Townsend, Tony Holmes and Hal Donly.

1. Minutes:

The observations made by Quimby Hess on the behaviour of the larval Karner Blue were from the St. Williams area and not from the incorrectly mentioned Pinery area. With this amendment the minutes were adopted as read.

2. Business arising:

- a) Alan Hanks circulated an interim copy of the Backus Woods report based on the reports which he has received. The final copy will contain sections on moths, beetles, dragonflies and specific life histories. This will be submitted sometime in November.
- b) Quimby still needs your collecting summaries for this year. He requests that the species be presented in the same order as in last year's Summary. The format should also conform to the same layout, i.e. (Toronto (19)(Glendon Hall), May 16).

3. Correspondence:

- c) A prospectus from Ianni Butterfly Enterprises of Cleveland, Ohio, with a list of considerata which included books, mounts, pins etc.

4. Financial report:

5. New Business:

6. Publications:

- a) Ron Lyons introduced a number of publications dealing with Odonata. He also introduced the <u>Audubon Handbook for Butterfly Watchers</u> by R.M. Pyle. It contains many fine points and observations presented in an easily readable form while stressing the need for conservation.
- b) Doug Scovell introduced the book <u>Love Among the Butterflies</u>, which is the diary of a Victorian Lady who collected butterflies. Doug felt that the social context and butterfly theme made this an interesting and entertaining book.
- c) Al Hanks presented a number of MNR publications dealing with the Gypsy moth in Ontario.
- d) Animal Voices, a publication of the Ontario Humane Society contained a short article entitled 'Ontario's Endangered Butterflies'.

7. Program:

Gord Townsend gave an extremely interesting account of his work around the world with bees. He introduced the topic by describing the distributions of the many honeybee groups found in the world and their redistribution due to man's subsequent colonization of new regions. The presentation continued with slides and explanations of the work done in Tanzania to promote and develop the honey industry in an area that has only marginally supported people in the past. The success of these endeavours was hard to believe. The presentation continued with slides from other countries such as South Africa, Brazil, Mexico and Australia. The habitat shots coupled with with the solutions to the various problems encountered by the people living in these areas made the presentation informative and interesting. This was obvious from the many questions that the audience had and from the discussions that ensued. It was a great presentation to have attended. Our thanks to Gord Townsend for his efforts.

Our next speaker will be Ron Lyons, who will talk about his trip to Costa Rica. He has promised that there are some butterflies among his slides!!


TORONTO ENTOMOL JGISTS' ASSOCIATION
